





directly for my back. Perhaps Rick knew this and decided to take the opportunity to teach me blue flagging! And what a teacher. Rick was the most patient one I'd had to this point in my turn working career. He stood behind me, giving me cues, giving me praise, telling me if I was early or late until I could see for myself whether I had made a mistake or popped it perfectly. Rick instilled in me his love of blue flagging and the love of doing it well. I've never forgotten that in my many moments of working turns. (I also did not forget his quick removal of me and my flag when a Porsche lost it and did indeed head directly for the turn station...) I recognized his good and generous heart that day and many days after.

Each time I saw Rick he would say "How ya doin', kid?" I felt I could probably tell him most anything and it would be okay, because I felt he really wanted to know. Throughout my active days in META when there were every size and shape of political battles, we often seemed to end up on opposite sides of the argument and screaming at each other. But we always ended up friends, and my respect for him grew.

When Westwood closed and Ross & I were pursuing other things and didn't see the old gang much, Rick would call at least once a year to find out how we were doing. He always watched Ross's career and was very supportive. Though we hadn't talked that way for the past few years, I knew he was still watching and cheering in his own way.

I fondly remember pre-META meeting meetings at Bino's, his ever-present coffee, cigarettes, and Halls cough drops (all of which he was more than happy to share), and the best of hugs in the chill of an early Spring pre-race meeting. Rick was the essence of selfless, tireless volunteerism. What he

did, and however he did it or said it, was done in the spirit of what he thought was the best for everyone, for others than himself.

I have missed being around him at races and meetings and his "How ya doin', kid?" for the last 10 years or so. I now will miss him for the rest of my life.

Made my acquaintance with a 'BARBER DODGE' which slid into our turn. Spent much of my time trying to figure out which INDY LIGHT was which, very important, since I was to be the 'BLUE FLAGGER.' There was a horrendous crash during the INDY LIGHTS race with cars becoming airborne. A reminder of the need to concentrate on safety at all times. The C.A.R.T. race was won by GIL de FERRAN in the #5 car. Learned the where abouts of SCCA city where I witnessed IAN COOK receiving a pie in the 'kisser.'

July meant Toronto, **HOGTOWN**, been there many times in the past on business but never for pleasure. **GUY** was the **T.M.** with **JOSE** and **MARC** from Montreal, **DEBBIE** and **PATRICK** from **'TO.'** We used a lot of hand signals for communication, practiced my miniscule French and my accent didn't seen to matter.

We were in turn 2A at the start of the back straight. Toronto was where I first did Comm for a session.
