MEMORIES OF MARY MARGARET AND BUZZ BELEY

Mary Margaret Beley was born December 4, 1916 in Cascade, Iowa and died November 25,2000 in Shelton, Washington. She was married in 1937 to Buzz, who passed away about three years ago.

Mary Margaret and Buzz Beley were long time turnworkers. Buzz passed away three years ago. I'm not sure when Mary Margaret and Buzz became SCCA members, as the Denver office does not show either as members.

But I know they must have been members for more than 35 years. I believe they started working races in New York and were also long time members of San Francisco region.

Mary Margaret and Buzz met each other when they both worked for United Airlines. Both of them retired from UAL. Buzz was the Senior dispatcher for pilots and Mary Margaret was a Customer Service Agent when they retired.

I do not know when they moved from California to Oregon, but Mary Margaret and Buzz were here when I joined SCCA in 1979. They both were working on the Oregon Region Communications team. Buzz at one time was a Turn Marshall when they worked SF. They were dedicated workers and loved racing. They worked both SCCA and ICSCC races and worked all of them until Mary Margaret could no longer take the cold weather and long hours standing because of her arthritis.

I'm speaking of both Mary Margaret and Buzz because they were always a pair. Buzz came to some of the races when Mary Margaret could not, but he would only come for one day, he did not want to leave her alone overnight.

I met Mary Margaret and Buzz Beley, her husband, early in the 70s at one of our Conference races at Westwood. I was Course Marshall at that time and I assigned both of them to Turn 2 with Rick Neyedli as Turnmarshall. During the lunch hour I talked to Rick and he was very impressed with their knowledge of motorsport, especially of SCCA, as they had been members for years. After the novice races on Saturday, we all gathered at Turn 2 for the famous hamburgers and brews and we exchanged ideas about turnworking in general and instantly we began a long friendship

After a couple of race events at Westwood, I offered them a place to stay with me whenever they came to Canada, and so began a tradition of going for supper and then discussing the weekend as we consumed some more brews. Mary Margaret was a true supporter of SCCA and we had some heated discussions about it as she was very outspoken. She was a very good communicator and as her Turnmarshall you had better be on your toes as she was not afraid to give her opinion.

We were also invited to visit them at their beautiful cottage near Shelton on the Olympic Peninsula, where they lived since their retirement. As time went by Mary Margaret suffered from arthritis in her hands and no medication seemed to calm the pain, so she was not able to continue to support her favourite hobby but she insisted that Buzz continued. Buzz attended the races at SIR. Doctors finally found a different medication and there were good signs that Mary Margaret would return to the sport, but as fate would have it, she fell in the hospital and seriously injured her back. We visited her in the hospital in Olympia and we talked about the old times. She was always asking about META and the Canadians as she was very proud to be an honorary member of our club. At that time, she told us that Buzz was suffering from Alzheimer's and was no longer allowed to drive, which stopped him from coming out to the races and shortly afterwards, he passed away.

Some time later, Gail Fetterman, Thomas Liesner, Ann and I visited Mary Margaret in the retirement home she had been moved to. We took her out for dinner and she was so happy to see us – none of us will ever forget that.

No doubt she is now happily bench racing with the likes of Rick Neyedli and of course her beloved Buzz. As a friend and a META member, I will miss Mary Margaret and she will stay in my heart for always.



CARBON FIBERS - Description

Carbon Fibers are to be found in composite materials. These materials generally consist of a resin which surrounds man-made reinforcing fibers. Numerous products from tennis racquets to jet planes are manufactured utilizing carbon fibers. Many of the components which make up the race cars competing at the Molson Indy also utilize carbon fibers. *CARBON FIBER HAZARDS*

Pure carbon fiber is chemically inactive and non-toxic. However, carbon fibers have the capacity to absorb other substances. Carbon fibers released from burning composite materials (such as a car on fire) are not pure but carry with them absorbed pyrolysis products. When exposed to elevated temperatures and fires, these substances become unstable and decompose into smaller respirable fibers. Carbon fibers tend to decompose to the 3-5 micron range, making them very light, transportable and easily carried over a large area by the wind or other movement. In the lungs the fibers penetrate the tissue and do not decompose, similar to fiberglass. Personal protective equipment must be worn prior to receiving a patient from an Indy car that has been on fire, or when extrication of the patient has necessitated any cutting of the car. Individual carbon fibers are very sharp and can penetrate the skin. Carbon fibers are electrically conductive and may be drawn into electrical equipment due to their being very light and easily airborne.

As you will be responding after Cart Medical, the fire hazard should be greatly minimized or eliminated. However, for your protection the following Safety precautions must be adhered to:

- 1) Do not expose yourself to an Indy car that is on fire. Burning carbon fiber is meant to be approached by trained personnel only, wearing special suits and self-contained breathing apparatus.
- 2) All Paramedics who have the potential to respond to track calls must wear Tyvek coveralls, the N95 Healthcare Particulate Respirator, safety glasses, and triple latex gloves. The N95 Healthcare Particulate Respirator minimizes wearer exposure to certain airborne particles in the size range of 0.1 to> 10.0 microns.
- 3) If you are receiving a patient from an Indy car that was on fire, it is preferable if the Cart Medical staff has already removed the driver's outer coveralls. If this is not possible, it is then imperative that you keep the driver's coveralls damp to stop the fibers from becoming airborne, lessening the opportunity for you to become exposed. Keeping the clothing damp will also reduce the likelihood of the fibers interfering with electrical equipment.

Carbon Fibers and their associated compounds in a decomposing state are extremely dangerous and carcinogenic.

The latest Darwin Awards update....

The Darwin Awards, for those not familiar, are for those individuals who contribute to the survival of the fittest by eliminating themselves from the gene pool before they have a chance to breed.

- 1. A young Canadian man, searching for a way of getting drunk cheaply, because he had no money with which to buy alcohol, mixed gasoline with milk. Not surprisingly, this concoction made him ill, and he vomited into the fireplace in his house. This resulting explosion and fire burned his house down, killing both him and his sister.
- 2. Three Brazilian men were flying in a light aircraft at low altitude when another plane approached. It appears that they decided to moon the occupants of the other plane, but lost control of their own aircraft and crashed. They were all found dead in the wreckage with their pants around their ankles.
- 3. A 27-year-old French woman lost control of her car on a highway near Marseilles and crashed into a tree, seriously injuring her passenger and killing herself. As a commonplace road accident, this would not have qualified for a Darwin nomination, were it not for the fact that the driver's attention had been distracted by her Tamagotchi key ring, which had started urgently beeping for food as she drove along. In an attempt to press the correct buttons to save the Tamagotchi's life, the woman lost her own.
- 4. A 22-year-old Reston, VA man was found dead after he tried to use octopus straps to bungee jump off a 70-foot railroad trestle. Fairfax County police said Eric Barcia, a fast-food worker, taped a bunch of these straps together, wrapped an end around one foot, anchored the other end to the trestle at Lake Accotink Park, jumped and hit the pavement.
