Hi all,

I received news tonight that our dear friend and mentor, Gordy Ensing, is gravely ill in the hospital.

He is in the critical care unit at Spectrum in Grand Rapids and cannot have visitors.

Early this year Gordy came down with what he thought was going to be a nagging chronic disease called Relapsing Polychondritus.

It is a rare illness that can take several forms, I guess, and his has become very serious lately, compromising his pulmonary function severely.

He was taken to the hospital last Thursday and had deteriorated until he was put on a ventilator over the weekend.

He remains mostly unconscious but has started to come around a bit today. There is no definitive prognosis as of yet but, if they can clear his

lungs of fluid, the doctors can determine a course of treatment and provide one.





## Kitsap Gets Inside Track on NASCAR Speedway

June 23, 2005

South Kitsap County is the preferred spot for a NASCAR racetrack, the Kitsap Sun learned Wednesday. Racetrack developer and promoter International Speedway Corp. will announce this morning that it intends to build an 80,000-seat track south of the Bremerton National Airport.

The ISC released some details of the proposal early to the Kitsap Sun on Wednesday afternoon but did not release information on a financing package or naming rights.

The proposed track would be 7/8 mile to 1.2 miles, surrounded by parking and camping areas on 950 acres near Lake Flora Road and Highway 3, along the Kitsap-Mason county line.

Fans coming by car, RVs or bus would walk into a tiered grandstand and look down into the track, inset like a bowl with Mount Rainier in the background.

The announcement could mark an end to a nearly two-year Northwest track site search that included the announcement of a preferred spot in Snohomish County last September. That deal fell apart two months later.

"I've had a feeling from day one that we would have an opportunity at this," said Kitsap County Commissioner Jan Angel. "Even when Snohomish County was picked the first time, I felt that we'd get a chance."

Economic development agencies throughout Western Washington and Oregon have vied for the chance to lure a track to their area.

The track could annually generate \$87.3 million to \$121.8 million for the region mostly from out-of-state tourists, according to a study commissioned by businesses, including Haselwood Auto Group, and economic development leaders who backed the idea. That could mean \$2.2 million to \$4 million in state taxes and \$3.7 million to \$4.5 million in local taxes.

Opponents, however, are wary of the public investment the company will inevitably ask from the state and county.

The company envisions a public-private partnership similar to what was proposed in Snohomish in which the public would own part of the facility, necessary to secure state bonds to fund construction. Those bonds would be paid off by revenue generated from the track.

The company used similar financing to build other tracks, including the Kansas Speedway near Kansas City, Kan., completed in 2001. The ISC owns outright most of its 11 tracks.

When a track was proposed in Snohomish, the price tag reached an estimated \$300 million in track construction and road costs.

ISC representatives said it was premature to say how much they will ask from the state and county for a Kitsap track.

The site also would include various buildings for garages, administrative offices, suites and a media center.

The track, which could grow to 90,000 seats, would have around 50 full-time employees.

It would be expected to host three weekends of major racing annually, one likely from the Nextel Cup series, the premier series of the National Association of Stock Car Auto Racing company, commonly known as NASCAR.

The ISC would request that a race date for a Nextel race be moved to a Northwest track site from another spot on the racing circuit.

Though the company could not guarantee a Nextel race, its request would be likely granted. The ISC is primarily controlled by the same family that owns NASCAR.

On non-race weekends, the track could be used for a variety of events, including trade shows, walkathons, conventions and wine festivals.

"In Kansas City, we have about 225 days the track is in use," said Stan Tate, director of public relations for ISC-owned Kansas Speedway.

## Why us?

Kitsap County rated high on the ISC's list early in its search, said ISC Vice President Grant Lynch.

The company had been searching for a track in the Northwest because its market in the Southeast has been mostly saturated and it believes there's a racing market in the Northwest.

The nearest NASCAR track is in Sonoma in Northern California.

The company has at least 11,000 ticket-buying fans in Washington, Oregon and Idaho, Lynch said.

Since the company first started inquiring in Washington in September 2003, the Kitsap Economic Development Council, a private nonprofit agency, had been sending the company promotional materials, such as a video with picturesque aerial views and a detailed marketing proposal.

"I would say from experience, projects like this size and scope come along to a community once in a generation," said KEDC executive director David Porter.

Isolated by water, Kitsap presents potential traffic flow issues. Lynch said the ISC would use the ferry system, shuttle buses and park-and-rides to get fans to the track. The ISC also can direct race fans to various routes and even suggest car pool possibilities by using information from ticket sales, he added.

Company representatives also were enticed by already-planned road work, such as a new Tacoma Narrows bridge and the proposed Belfair Bypass.

"We could make the transportation system work," Lynch said.

In addition, the South Kitsap Industrial Area already is zoned for industrial use, including racetrack use.

But one of the sweetest parts of the deal would be having to deal with only one land owner instead of dozens as in Snohomish.

Overton & Associates owns the property as well as adjacent property in Kitsap and Mason Counties.

### What's next?

Today's announcement is the beginning of what is expected to be a long process.

The company must gain acceptance from the Legislature and go through the permitting process in Kitsap County before construction can start in 2007 or 2008.

And the company will have to answer many questions from the public and commissioners.

"There are a lot of things to consider for Kitsap County," said Commissioner Chris Endresen, who is on vacation this week and was told of details via phone. "We need to have a cost-benefit analysis, we have to consider the noise and the traffic impacts. ... Is it financially sustainable? And there's the environmental concerns."

"At this point, we don't know what kind of finance package they're talking about," she said. "I know that we don't ... have a lot of excess revenue."

County Commissioner Patty Lent was unavailable for comment.

ISC officials also will have to go through a lengthy process with the county community development department in order to get approval to build a racetrack on the 950-acre site.

That process includes a pre-application conference, a master plan and conditional-use permit application, and several environmental review studies before a building permit is issued.

Public comment will be accepted as part of each step. The company plans to host a public forum in late July. Further, ISC officials need to work with local and state government officials on transportation issues surrounding the site, and work with legislators in Olympia during the next session on securing a public finance package to help pay for the facility.

The company also will have to face existing opposition that will be strengthened by today's announcement. Earlier this year, a group called Citizens for Healthy Economic Choices in Kitsap formed to oppose the track.

"When you have projects this large, you just have to take it piece by piece," Angel said.
