NIGEL MANSELL, the 1992 F-1 world champion, is to make a comeback to grand prix racing. Now 52 years old, Mansell has finally been lured out of retirement by a deal witch commits him to the Altech Grand Prix Masters as a driver and ambassador - 45 is the minimum age - and the first race is scheduled for South Africa's Kyalami circuit on November 13. Mansell is set to be reunited with many of his past adversaries. Five-time world champion Alain Prost has signed up, along with two-time titleholder Emerson Fittipaldi and Alan Jones. Mansell said: "It is a serious business and we want to go racing seriously. This won't be a Sunday afternoon drive with people like this around."

Since he retired in 1995, Mansell has concentrated on building a championship golf complex in the West Country and trying to gain a place on the British Seniors Tour. "The idea of a Grand Prix Masters series has been muted by many for years and at last the dream has become a reality," said Mansell.

"The hunger and desire to go racing never leaves your blood. The right opportunity has never come along until now.

"It's one thing to reacquaint myself with adversaries such as Prost, Fittipaldi and Ricardo Patrese, but throw in 200mph grand prix cars on legendary race tracks and you have the ingredients for a very special championship. "The rivalry between us all will be no different from the glory days back in the Nineties. The preparation, commitment and desire to win will be no less than the last time I drove a grand prix car in anger."

In addition to the Kyalami race, the series is set to confirm five more for the 2006 championship calendar.

Preparing for Emergencies, And Surviving the First 3 Days

What do wind storms, floods, snow storms, forest fires, train derailments, apartment fires, meth-amphetamine labs, industrial chemical spills, and land slides all have in common?

Answer.

- 1. they have all occurred in BC in the last 10 years,
- 2. all have caused large evacuations,
- 3. all have displaced people from their homes for several days,
- 4. most have caused power outages for several days.

Knowing the Risks – A "Pop Quiz":

- When is the last time Mount Baker erupted? (year 1870)
- How many earthquakes occur in BC each year? (Approximately 800)
- How many people were evacuated during "Firestorm" in 2003 (Approximately 50,000)
- How many chemical spills, floods, fires, etc were there in BC in 2004? (2942 incidents)
- When an earthquake occurs, what are you supposed to do? ("drop, cover & hold"!! "Drop" down low to the ground, take "cover" under a table or other sturdy object that can protect you from falling debris, "hold" onto the table legs so it doesn't slide away from you)

It's easy to prepare yourself and your family to deal with emergencies. Last month we learned about what to include in a "grab & go" emergency kit. These kits are important, because emergencies and evacuation orders usually come with little or no warning. It's incredibly important to put these items together in one place; it isn't enough to say that you have the items available but spread around your home.

When an emergency occurs, it's important to know how to protect yourself and your family. One simple precaution is to familiarize your household members with the shut off switches for electricity, natural gas, and water. In an emergency, don't shut off your natural gas unless you have a gas leak or fire!! (You can usually detect a natural gas leak, as it contains mercaptan, a product that makes it smell like rotten eggs).

As part of your plan, make sure you and your family agree on a contact telephone number out of province. If you have to evacuate your home and you get separated, you can all call that number to tell people you're OK and where you've relocated to. Carry that phone number with you in your wallet.

Lastly, include a package of quarters in your "grab & go" kit. If a disaster causes a large disruption to telephone services, they will likely activate pay phones before they activate your home or cell phone lines.





McIntosh gets the call for Canada

New Series: Coquitlam driver "honored" to represent country in A1 Grand Prix

Like any proud Canadian, Sean McIntosh is thrilled to represent his country.

The Coquitlam race driver will hit England's Brands Hatch circuit this weekend in a Lola decked out in the red and white of the Maple Leaf in a new series called Al Grand Prix. Bankrolled by a Dubai sheik, the series bills itself as the World Cup of Motorsport.

Drivers race in identical Lola chassis with Cooper tires and 550-horsepower 3.4-litre ZytekV8 engines.

The cars are designed to get their downforce from mechanical grip rather than aerodynamics, which should mean less wake, or dirty air, and more nose-to-tail racing and overtaking.

Four qualifying sessions determine the grid for a rolling start to a half-hour morning sprint, then the main race begins with a standing start, the order determined by finishes in the sprint.

"It's an honour to represent Canada," McIntosh said when reached on his cell phone at a noisy Northampton restaurant five minutes from Silverstone at his English base of Towchester. "It's an opportunity to travel all over the world in the winter competing in all the events. I'm quite excited."

The AIGP has a field of 25 cars, each representing a separate country. Nations as diverse as the U.S. and South Africa, Australia and Indonesia, England and Lebanon are represented.

There will be 12 races in 12 countries, Mexico and Laguna Seca, are the North American stops, with a season finale in Shanghai, China, in April.

Race purses are \$1 million US, with the winner taking home \$300,000. Of the 10 cars that tested Monday, McIntosh was fastest in the second session and second-fastest overall.

Not bad for a guy who only climbed into the car for the first time that day "It took a bit of getting used to in the beginning" said the 20-year-old, who's racing in his second British Formula Renault season, which uses cars with about 200 horsepower. "The first few times on the straightaway, I was like 'Whoa! This is quick.' "But your body gets used to it and you get down to feeling the car. It's just bigger and heavier (than Formula Renault), not too far off a Champ Car, I think."

Mcintosh's move to Britain is now paying the kind of dividend he'd hoped for when he joined the Renault series last year and won rookie of the year.

He's won five times this season. With two races to go (also at Brands Hatch) and 67 points up for grabs, McIntosh trails Oliver Jarvis by 16 points — 397-381 — in the championship hunt.

He'd initially lobbied to drive for Team Canada in August. (Teams are recognized, not drivers — Jacques Villeneuve, for example, could conceivably drive qualifying sessions before the race and McIntosh run the race, under the rules.)

McIntosh had a test lined up, then the team abruptly cancelled it at the last minute. But a new owner took over, Canadian businessman Wade Cherwayko, and knowing McIntosh's name from the British racing scene, he phoned eight days ago and offered him the job.

McIntosh, aware as anyone of how hard drivers have to scramble to find sponsorship, especially back home in Canada, is extremely grateful.

"It's unbelievable to just show up and get to work," he said. "It's starting to become a job, where you're not having to always raise the funding to drive. It's quite an honor." gordmcintyre@png.canwest.com
